Season 36 *Pursuit of the American Dream*

Thank you for your continued interest and support. We began the fiscal year looking for rental theaters for our first "in-person" productions since the pandemic shutdown. Due to limited venues and scheduling conflicts, we spoke with 15+ facilities. Finally, we found two spaces to serve as host for our nearly sold-out season— 20th anniversary production of *It's a Wonderful Life: Live in Chicago!*, the Chicago premiere of *Stand Up If You Are Here Tonight*, and August Wilson's *Fences*.

Our bittersweet anniversary production of *Wonderful Life* marked the first time without our beloved Ensemble member John Mohrlein as "Clarence / Mr. Potter". We were blessed to have him read and present in this year's rehearsals. John gave his wholehearted approval for his replacement, Artistic Affiliate Joe Dempsey. John and Joe slowly walking to the car after John's final rehearsal is an indelible image that many of us will always remember.

We returned to in-person performances while grieving, adapting to COVID compliance, learning new institutional rental processes and infrastructure, and doubling our marketing efforts to tell patrons *where* we were performing. Meanwhile, we were quietly looking at real estate, speaking with financial advisors and lenders, producing a 3-show slate and with full auxiliary programming, and chewing our nails to the quick.

This amount of extraordinary stress placed upon an organization would typically yield a shuttering. Instead, our company huddled, leaned into the hurt, and pledged a deeper loyalty and trust in one another. The best surprise of the year? A *three-decade-in-the-making* dream of securing a permanent artistic home had finally been realized.

To meet this moment, it took all the active and emeritus artists, Board members, donors, administrative staff, and patrons who have uplifted and supported us over the years. Board member Kimberlee Herold was an early champion in establishing our permanent venue at 5627 N. Lincoln. Without her enthusiasm and leadership, this property would not be in our possession today.

The year was full of lessons in resiliency, grit, and gratitude. Fortunately, they just hit a little closer to *home*.

Our artists work throughout the nation - including Broadway and regional theaters - and loyally return to our stage.

American Blues Theater is committed to developing the classic plays and musicals of tomorrow. More than half of our mainstage productions are world and Chicago premieres. Our new play development consists of a variety of programs – including world and Chicago premieres, the nationally-recognized *Blue Ink Award*, commissions, *The Room* staged readings, *The Garage* concerts, and annual *Ripped Festival* of new short-plays. Our Arts Education offerings include acclaimed programming in Chicago Public School classrooms, artist-led instruction for all ages through *Classes for the Masses*, and being a Chicago-anchor for the national #ENOUGH: Plays to End Gun Violence program.

We believe it is an honor and duty to serve our community. We raise awareness of other non-profit organizations' commendable causes through creative collaborations. We hold food drives, distribute promotional materials, offer free post-show discussions, provide complimentary tickets, honor military personnel, hold exclusive performances for underserved communities, and raise awareness for children's surgeries.




















BLUES THEATER

2022 BLUE INK AWARD

The nationally-renowned Blue Ink Award for playwriting was created in 2010 to support new work. Since inception, we've named 12 Award winners, 112 finalists, and 171 semi-finalists. Nearly \$10,000 in cash and prizes was distributed to playwrights in 2022.

2022 WINNER

The Reapers on Woodbrook Avenue by Mardee Bennett

The Reapers on Woodbrook Avenue was selected from a pool nearly 700 submissions. As part of the award, Bennett receives a \$2,500 cash prize, a staged reading at American Blues Theater, and the opportunity to further develop his script with our artists.

Mardee Bennet notes, "I am elated to have my work selected by American Blues Theater. Set in mid-century Baltimore, *The Reapers on Woodbrook Avenue* is the tale of a family striving for what was once called the American dream. It is also a political drama that speaks to the state of the nation with grace and humor. The opportunity to develop this play in one of the theater capitals of the world— Chicago—is a delight. The *Blue Ink Award* adds legitimacy to my work. For that I am profoundly grateful."

"We are thrilled to announce Mardee Bennett's script *The Reapers on Woodbrook Avenue* as the 2022 winner," notes Artistic Director Gwendolyn Whiteside. "Mardee created an incredibly detailed world with rich characters that leap off the page and into our hearts. We're honored to share this relevant and timeless story."

ABOUT THE REAPERS ON WOODBROOK AVENUE

Spanning decades, this heartrending play explores the complex relationship between three generations of women: Loretta Reaper, a middle-aged Black woman, her grown, spitfire daughter, Nell, and her starry-eyed granddaughter Tamar. Raised in the church, all three ladies cut a mean cloth while taking us on a riveting journey through time, exhuming long-buried family secrets, and creating gospel fire in the process.



Our *Ripped: The Living Newspaper Project* began in 2009 with a series of staged readings of short plays based on the 1930s WPA era program "The Living Newspaper" and Federal Writers' Project, enabling artists such as Ralph Ellison, Susan Glaspell, Zora Neale Hurston, Eugene O'Neill, Studs Terkel, and Richard Wright. Since our inaugural 2009 launch, we've presented 21 events and utilized 610+ artists that feature short plays *ripped from today's headlines*.

In 2013, we expanded our staged readings into the sold-out, one-night-only, annual event – *The Ripped Festival*. All proceeds of these annual events benefit our free arts education program, including "The Lincoln Project" in Chicago Public Schools. In addition, we showcase short plays from CPS students who've completed our course.

Due to the pandemic and industry shutdown of live events, we presented *The Ripped Festival* as an online library for the first time in June 2020. 2022 marked our third year of celebrating writers and their short plays with the *Ripped Festival* online library.

Our annual festival cultivates new material and allows audiences to discuss topical issues together. American Blues Theater provides community service and raises awareness through creative collaborations. The following organizations have been supported by *Ripped* events since its inception in 2009: AgrAbility, American Indian Chicago, Chicago Public Schools, Greater Chicago Food Depository, Illinois Farm Bureau, Lincoln Park Community Shelter, NAACP Legal Defense & Education Fund, No Kid Hungry, University of Chicago's Urban Education Teachers Program, and more.

OUR FIRST HOME

We are thrilled to announce the launch of "Our First Home" campaign and purchase of a 17,965 square foot property in Chicago's Lincoln Avenue North Arts District (LANA). This will establish the first permanent home in our history!

"This historic move to a permanent home is over 35 years in the making. After decades of leasing, including the beloved space on Byron Avenue, American Blues Theater will control its own artistic and financial destiny for the first time. Our exceptional Ensemble has dreamed of a dedicated home to expand our programming, education initiatives, and community partnerships," said American Blues Theater Artistic Director Gwendolyn Whiteside. "We understand all too well the limitations of being an itinerant company, and – with very few true subsidized venues in Chicago – we're also excited to create an affordable rental space for other theater companies on their respective journeys."



American Blues Theater's productions explore the lives of everyday people who inhabit the working neighborhoods of America. Its new venue, designed by John Morris of Morris Architects Planners with theater systems supported by Schuler Shook, fully embraces this ethos. Formerly the site of a Mobil gas station, Walgreens, and Dollar General, the building will be repurposed to establish a cultural institution that is accessible to all.

The new theater venue will include two theaters (148-seat proscenium and 40-seat flexible studio); an inviting lobby with box office, bar, and concessions; gendered and gender-neutral restrooms; dressing rooms and greenroom; administrative offices; production spaces for scenery, props, and costumes; a small on-site parking lot with ample street parking. The facility is accessible from Interstate 90 and 94 and via the CTA Brown line and buses.

Alderperson Andre Vasquez comments, "It is an absolute honor and dream to welcome such a landmark institution to the 40th Ward. I had a clear vision of creating a Lincoln Avenue North Arts District, but I could never have imagined that we'd be blessed by having American Blues Theater as a crown jewel. It would be impossible to overstate the importance of such a beautiful entertainment experience to the business district for the whole city, here in the 40th Ward!"

It will serve a community comprised of many cultural backgrounds and complement the area's local restaurants, schools, and the Budlong Woods Library. Whiteside said, "For over three decades, we've been working towards this dream. Through community support and the dedication of all our artists and staff over the years, we are able to make this dream a reality now."

The \$7.6 million "Our First Home" campaign will provide the company with funds for the building purchase, adaptive reuse within the building's existing footprint, construction, as well as a building reserve fund. With over \$4 million from individual donors raised to-date, the company anticipates completion in November 2023 with a grand opening celebration highlighted by the inaugural production of the beloved holiday classic, *It's a Wonderful Life: Live in Chicago!*

"I've been involved in many of Chicago's cultural institutions as a trustee, patron, and donor, but I have always had a soft spot for American Blues. It has been touchstone in my life. By supporting them now in achieving this momentous milestone, I am making a significant difference in the lives of these incredible artists and communities they serve," said Board Vice-President Kimberlee Herold. "Blues has proven again and again it deserves its own home, and I invite Chicago's individual donors, foundations, and corporations to join in this crucial effort."


